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WHO?	Who? Who participated? Who is involved? Who is affected? This segment features an inventor in the Philippines and IKEA. However, everyone has a role to play in helping the environment.
WHAT?	What? What is the topic of the oral text? What happened? What is the problem? What are the issues? The topic of the oral text is the ways people are changing their habits to help the environment. The Canadian government plans to put a price on carbon emissions, but 53 percent of Canadians have said they wouldn't change their behaviour to help their environment. Daniel thinks this is because people may not know how to help.
WHERE?	Where? Where did the event take place? Alternatively, where is the event taking place? This event is taking place around the world.
WHEN?	When? When did the event occur? When did the problem begin? This TVOK News segment is from December 6, 2018. (However, increased carbon emission levels continue to be an issue in the world.)
WHY?	Why? Why did the event, issue, or problem occur? The Earth's increased carbon emission levels are due to pollution caused by human activity.
HOW?	How? How is the issue important? How does it affect those involved? The Canadian government's carbon pricing plan affects everyone who lives in Canada. It's a way to help reduce carbon emissions which cause air pollution that is harmful to us all.

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Summary:

In this episode of TVOK News, Daniel highlights what people around the world are doing to make more sustainable choices. According to a poll, nearly 40 percent of Canadians don't know about the government's plan to put a price on carbon emissions. But even so, 53 percent said that they wouldn't change their behaviour to help the environment. Daniel notes that this might be because lifestyle changes can feel overwhelming. He shares a couple of examples of the ways people are trying to reduce their carbon emissions. For example, in the Philippines, a young inventor has found a way to create easy-to-build, affordable and sustainable houses from bamboo. His solution is environmentally friendly and it's helping to solve the housing crisis in that part of the world! As another example, IKEA is collaborating with rice straw collectors in India to make products out of leftover rice straw that would be burnt by farmers and pollute the air. Daniel brings the segment to a close by asking, what are you doing to help the environment? He invites viewers and/or listeners to email TVOKids News to share the things they are doing to help, big or small.
